





Sports Premium – Half Year Statement 2016/17

Income

The school continues to have money from Central Government on two occasions during the year, as before. The last two payments, based on the number of pupils on roll, have been £9 141 and £9169.

Expenditure (Provision)

The school continues to employ Progressive Sports in the same role as that described in last year's statement. In addition, two teachers have received coaching in the teaching of swimming. It is intended that this has three benefits:

- 1. The teachers concerned develop their personal confidence and expertise;
- 2. These two teachers share their expertise with their colleagues through in-school professional development meetings;
- 3. It will not be necessary to spend Sports Premium income again on this area of the curriculum as the school will have its own in-house expertise.

Effectiveness for Pupils and Staff

- Teachers have continued to enhance their subject expertise and confidence through working with Progressive Sports coaches, particularly in the following areas of the PE curriculum:
 - Gymnastics
 - Football
 - Netball
 - Throwing and catching

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- Tag rugby
- The school has developed its own in-house swimming expertise, as described above.











The pupils have enjoyed an increasing depth of personal expertise in a growing range of PE opportunities, such as gymnastics, football, netball, throwing and catching, tag rugby, dodgeball and dance.

• A large number of pupils have been motivated to take part in a range of sporting and PE opportunities through attendance at in-school clubs or through the wider opportunities offered in the community. The tables below, while not exhaustive, give an idea of the figures involved:

SPORTS PREMIUM – END OF YEAR STATEMENT 2016/17

Income

The school has continued to enjoy ring-fenced funds from the Government. This money is promised for the next few years, which is good news as it allows the school to develop a longer term development plan (SDP – see below). It has recently been confirmed that this year, schools with 17 or more eligible pupils will receive £16,000 and an additional payment of £10 per pupil. This means that the funding has doubled since last year.

Expenditure and Effective Outcomes

- Sports Premium money has been used effectively to expand the range of sports being enjoyed and to capitalize on the opportunities provided by the move to the current site.
- The PE leader has compiled a useful and interesting folder of photographs cataloguing sport-related matches and events for the past school year.
- The folder contains good evidence of the benefits derived from having employed Progressive Sports (PS) over the past few years. This is particularly evidenced by the number of local events attended as a result of the enthusiasm and expertise engendered by PS staff. These events include football, netball, athletics, tag rugby, High 5 netball, cricket and "Quad Kids".

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The folder also shows healthy participation rates in inter-school events (details in next bullet point) as well as of interest in wider sporting events, such as the Tour of Britain and the Race for Life.

- As well as measuring success in terms of improved participation levels it can also be evidenced by many team and individual successes with, for example, the football squad coming runners-up in the local tournament and the cricket team reaching the County finals.
- There are also accounts of visits by Eddie the Eagle and Andy Lewis (Olympic and Paralympic sportsmen).
- Further success of the measures taken so far to use the Sports Premium money to good effect can be seen in the enthusiasm for extending the house system currently used for good work and behaviour to include competitive sports within the school; this is part of the development plans for next year (see below).

Future Plans

- The subject leader is enthusiastic and is keen to improve the provision in PE with good ideas of how to do so.
- She is well aware that some of her colleagues have not received the same amount of training as others this year. As part of the subject development plan (SDP), this inequality will be addressed. It is likely that training will be, for all teachers, in the area of gymnastics and how best to use the equipment the School already has to enhance and extend the pupils' levels of expertise.
- Also part of the SDP are the development of Play Leaders from Years 5 and 6 to help run
 activities and the continuation of the "Daily Mile", a popular part of the School's
 approach to fitness for all, according to the latest audit of pupils' views about the PE they
 receive.
- Importantly, the PE leader also intends to consult with colleagues as to the best way to involve those children for whom competitive team sports are less popular or effective.

Future Finance Allocation

- Part of the ring-fenced income for 2017 2018 will be used to employ the enthusiastic and effective services of Progressive Sports staff for the year (c. £4 500).
- The funding of lunchtime clubs takes a further £3 800.
- Some of the money will be used to fund a minibus service for pupils to attend morning clubs before school. This minibus service will also be used to transport children to sporting competitions and events in the local area.







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Some of the funding will also be invested in upskilling the existing PE lead through the completion of the Level 5 Certificate in Primary School Physical Education Specialism with the view to moving on to the Level 6 qualification.

• The remainder of the income, topped up by some £350 from central school funds, will finance further training and the resources needed to ensure the successful rollout of the



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
