





### St White's Primary School End of Year Sports Premium Statement- 2020 to 2021

#### Income

- As previously explained, the school receives funding from the Government that <u>must</u> be spent on enhancing the provision and standards of physical activity for all the children in the school.
- For this school year we received a total of £18,528 some of which was received early in the Autumn Term 2020 and some later in the school year. This phased payment is normal practice in education and comes as a result of financial years and school years not coinciding.

### **Expenditure**

• The school spent £6093.71 in the last FINANCIAL year and brought forward into this financial year £12,434.29. This money was used in the Summer Term 2020, as forecast in the last Sports Premium report.

### **Impact**

- A reminder of the Key Indicators (KIs) of success:
  - 1. KI 1: The engagement of <u>all pupils</u> in regular physical activity Chief Medical Officer guid<mark>elin</mark>es recommend that primary school children undertake at least 30 minutes of physical activity a day in school.
  - 2. KI2: The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.
  - 3. KI3: Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
  - 4. KI4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.
  - 5. KI5: Increased participation in competitive sport.

This year has been successful even with the challenge of Covid-19 as the following evidence shows.

#### KI 1:

- All pupils are participating in 2 hours of curriculum PE every week which included a range of non-traditional sports including daily mile, archery, boccia, kurling and yoga.
- All pupils participated in at least 1 house game over the year in UKS2 (Autumn and Summer term).
- Intervention based activity for inactive pupils in LKS2 after lockdown which were identified by class teachers. Pupils participated in extra physical activity to engage and excite in a variety of inclusive sports seated volleyball, table tennis and archery.

















#### **KI2:**

- The school has participated in sporting events as soon as Covid-19 restrictions were lifted. These included some virtual events and one face to face event. 22 pupils in year 5 and 6 participated in a cricket competition local to Cinderford. One team came first and the other 3<sup>rd</sup> helping to raise the profile of cricket in school. Lockdown competitions via Teams emphasized the importance of physical activity at home.
- Kayaking was completed by 13 year 6's to provide opportunity to those who would not normally have this opportunity.
- Sportsmanship trophies for each class has raised the profile of sportsmanship across the school and pupils demonstrating this at live events.
- Sportsmanship values are now whole school values.
- At these competitions and festivals, pupils were able to wear new team kit purchased with sports premium funding.
- New staff kit has been purchased for new and existing staff including members of senior leadership team.
- Class sports days added a level of competition in which pupils were excited to compete and raise the profile of athletics across the school.
- Professional coaches to lead PE lessons across the school and to provide extracurricular clubs has helped to create links within the community. These included tag rugby and tennis (summer term).
- Pupils in Heron class attended Ross-On-Wye golf club to experience a new sport and engage in an opportunity they may not receive.

#### **KI3:**

- GetSet4PE has increased the knowledge of staff by providing high quality lessons for pupils.
- CPD has been offered for staff through GetSet4PE to develop aspects such as games and dance.
- Professional coaches leading PE lessons whilst teaching staff support has helped to demonstrate a range of games, teaching points and assessment in tag rugby and tennis. As a result, staff confidence has increased and the pupils moved forward with their learning.
- PE lead has provided enrichment days for pupils introducing new sports so that staff can use these within PE lessons. Demonstrating behaviour strategies in PE and inclusive competition.
- PE lead has provided support for a multi academy trust and this has helped review the practice at St White's and this has supported the progress of PE in school.

#### **KI4:**

After school clubs in 2020-21 included KS1 and KS2 football, KS1 multi-sports, KS2 dodgeball, KS2 netball and KS2 archery. These were

















only able to run in Autumn and Summer 2 terms due to Covid-19

- Lockdown challenges provided through teams so that pupils were still active during the pandemic.
- Enrichment days for the whole school new age kurling, boccia and archery.
- GetSet4PE includes a range of non-traditional sports for example volleyball.
- School Games video recorded to be shared with the county to show physical education at St White's.

**KI5**:

- Year 6 pupils took part in local cricket competition run by GCC and achieved 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>.
- Year 6 pupils were selected to record a video to share at the school games county finals with the whole of Gloucestershire.
- Every pupil in KS2 participated in at least one house game over the year.
