Vincent Van Gogh

Vincent Willem van Gogh was a Dutch post-impressionist painter who is among the most famous and influential figures in the history of Western art. In just over a decade, he created about 2,100 artworks, including around 860 oil paintings, most of which date from the last two years of his life.

The Harvest- Vincent Van Gogh

Location: Van Gogh Museum

Created: 1888-1888

Periods: Modern art, Post-Impressionism

Subject: Arles, La Crau



Van Gogh wanted to show peasant life and work on the land – a recurring theme in his art – and painted several stages of the harvest. We see a half mowed wheatfield, ladders and several carts. A reaper works in the background, which is why he titled the work La moisson or 'The Harvest'. Van Gogh considered it one of his most successful paintings, writing to his brother Theo that the 'canvas absolutely kills all the rest'.

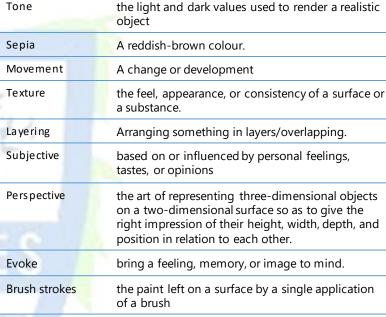

Post-impressionism

Post-Impressionism is an art movement that developed in the 1890s. It is characterised by a subjective approach to painting, as artists opted to evoke emotion rather than realism in their work.
