This term we are going to focus on writing for a purpose and thinking about your audience. Every Tuesday until 29th May, I would like you to work on a 500 word story entry for the Mitcheldean Young Poets Competition. I will attach more documents relating it to this one but here is a summary. (You can also enter the young poets competition.)



YOUNG POETS COMPETITION: As before - four age groups: 5-8; 9-11:12; & 13-15*. Book token prizes of £20, £10 & £5 for 1st, 2nd & 3rd in each group. Closing date for entries: Friday 29th May 2020; results announced at the end of June. A selection of poems on 'forest' themes from poets in the first two age groups will later be forwarded for entry to the 'Junior Bard' Competition to be held in October.



YOUNG STORYTELLERS COMPETITION: Two age groups (up to 11; & 12 and over). Choice of subject left to the author and stories may be any length up to a maximum approx 500 words. Closing date for entries as above

The competition is going to be mostly online this year as they are not sure if they will be able to hold the festival. That means there are also be bonus prizes...



Story writing and poetry rules

1. Age is as at 31st August 2020.

- 2. Stories can be on any subject and of any length up to a maximum of approx. 500 words.
- 3. Competition is limited to one story per entrant.

7. Please keep a copy of your poem as manuscripts cannot be returned. 8. The adjudicators' decisions are final and no correspondence will be entered into regarding individual entries.

9. Winning poems will be featured in the following year's programme unless consent is withheld and the committee advised accordingly.

Well done to those of you that sent me your drafts. I have replied with some comments on how I think you can make your wonderful stories even better. Today I would like you to re-draft your work and try to edit and improve the things that I have sent you. I do not expect you to write the whole 500 words out again but I would like you to at least rewrite a paragraph to make it even better. If you would like feedback on what you have written please feel free to send me your work. Remember put ... under any words that you aren't sure of the spelling of so that it doesn't disrupt your flow. Get set up ready to write with a quiet place, a pen or pencil that works and a drink so that you don't need to keep getting up and being distracted. I say this because I am the expert at getting distracted when I am working at home!

Wider curriculum

Every day, I will send a lesson or two that focusses on the wider curriculum that we teach at school (RE, PE, PSHE, Geography, History, Art, DT, Science, Computing, Music, French). I will try and keep this the same as our school timetable to help you maintain a clear routine. You will have one PE lesson a week that requires you to look at famous athletes, from past and present. But please make sure that you are staying active. Remember, the Joe Wicks workout on youtube is also a great start to the day.

On Tuesdays, we will focus on our topic history and geography. This term we are going to be looking at the Ancient Greeks and Greece in geography.

Today, we are going to be looking at the physical geography of Greece and its climate.

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This was the comparison of the weather in Cinderford and Greece on a sunny Wednesday as I was working in my garden. Even just through this snapshot though we can see that there are some differences in the weather and the temperatures. What do you notice?

Below are the average temperatures for both Athens (the capital of Greece) and Gloucester (not the capital of England but a place you might know!).


