Good Friday	The Friday before Easter Sunday, on which
	the Crucifixion of Christ is commemorated in
	the Christian Church. It is traditionally a day
	of fasting and penance.

Technical vocabulary

Easter Sunday

Commemorates the resurrection of Jesus.

Betrayal

The breaking of someone's trust.

Crucified

How Jesus died on the cross.

Salvation

Being saved (or kept away from) sin and evil.

Lent

Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter.

Good Friday

On Good Friday, Jesus Christ was executed by crucifixion. His body was taken down from the cross, and buried in a cave.

The tomb was guarded and an enormous stone was put over the entrance, so that no-one could steal the body.
