







# St White's Primary School End of Year Sports Premium Statement- 2021 to 2022

#### Income

- As previously explained, the school receives funding from the Government that <u>must</u> be spent on enhancing the provision and standards of physical activity for all the children in the school.

## Impact

- A reminder of the Key Indicators (KIs) of success:

  - 2. KI2: The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.
  - 3. KI3: Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
  - 4. KI4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.
  - 5. KI5: Increased participation in competitive sport.

This year has been successful even with the continued challenge of Covid-19 as the following evidence shows.

# KI 1:

- All pupils are participating in 2 hours of curriculum PE every week which included a range of non-traditional sports including daily mile, archery, climbing, boccia, kurling and yoga.
- All pupils participated in at least 1 house game over the year in UKS2.
- 95% of pupils in UKS2 competed in intra-school events over the year.

#### KI2:

- The school has participated in numerous sporting events. Over 40 children have represented school at local football events and this included both boys and girls. 22 pupils in year 5 and 6 participated in a cricket competition local to Cinderford. One team came first and the other 3<sup>rd</sup> helping to raise the profile of cricket in school. Pupils then participated in the county finals in Bristol competing against the best schools in the county.
- The whole school experienced a climbing wall in Autumn term which then provided links to an after school club at a local climbing center.
- Sportsmanship trophies for each class has raised the profile of sportsmanship across the school. Pupils then regularly demonstrate this at live events and is regularly commented on.
- Sportsmanship values are interlocked with whole school values.
- At these competitions and festivals, pupils were able to wear team kit purchased with sports premium funding (2020-2021).
- New staff kit has been purchased for new and existing staff including members of senior leadership team.
- Phase sports day added a high level of competition and allowed all pupils to participate. Sportsmanship awards, medals and stickers were awarded for all pupils. Parents were invited to spectate the event and helped raise the profile of competition.
- Whole school sports morning encourage all pupils to be successful and included to score points for their houses.
- Handpicked, professional coaches to lead PE lessons across the school and to provide extracurricular clubs has helped to create links within the community.
- 8 pupils attended once in a lifetime opportunities at NO 1 court at Wimbledon. Tickets were purchased through the LTA and helped raise the profile of tennis after receiving tennis coaching in school.
- 30 pupils attended a training session at Kingsholm stadium and watched a Premiership rugby game by Gloucester Rugby, Pupils had the opportunity to meet players and helped raise the profile of rugby.
- The British Dodgeball championships were attended in Cirencester to help raise the profile of a non-traditional sport finishing on second place.

#### KI3:

- GetSet4PE has increased the knowledge of staff by providing high quality lessons for pupils.
- CPD has been offered for staff through GetSet4PE to develop aspects such as games and dance.









# Challenge, Commit, Conquer and Celebrate



- Professional coaches leading PE lessons whilst teaching staff support has helped to demonstrate a range of games, teaching points and assessment in dance, tag rugby and tennis. As a result, staff confidence has increased and the pupils moved forward with their learning.
- PE lead has provided enrichment days for pupils introducing new sports so that staff can use these within PE lessons. Demonstrating behaviour strategies in PE and inclusive competition.
- PE lead has provided support for a multi academy trust and this has helped review the practice at St White's and this has supported the progress of PE in school.

### KI4:

- After school clubs in 2021-22 included KS1 and KS2 football, KS1 multi-sports, KS2 dodgeball, KS2 netball and KS2 archery. able to run in Autumn and Summer 2 terms due to Covid-19
- Enrichment days for the whole school climbing.
- GetSet4PE includes a range of non-traditional sports for example volleyball.
- 8 pupils attended once in a lifetime opportunities at NO 1 court at Wimbledon. Tickets were purchased through the LTA and helped raise the profile of tennis after receiving tennis coaching in school.
- 30 pupils attended a training session at Kingsholm stadium and watched a Premiership rugby game by Gloucester Rugby, Pupils had the opportunity to meet players and helped raise the profile of rugby.
- The British Dodgeball championships were attended in Cirencester to help raise the profile of a non-traditional sport finishing on second place.
- **KI5**:
- Year 5/6 boys and girls participated in Cross country event with pupils finishing 3rd and 6th out of 150 runners.
- Year 5/6 boys football league. Over 6 events throughout the year and 60 matches of football, boys competed in the Pro Stars football league where they finished league champions.
- Year 3/4 boys football league. Over 6 events throughout the year and 60 matches of football, boys competed in the Pro Stars football league where they finished runners-up.
- Year 5/6 boys won a playoff to be Forest of Dean champions. They represented the Forest of Dean at the county championships and finished 6th in the county.

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- 19 Year 5/6 boys and girls competed in the annual sports hall athletics and finished 1st.
- Year 5/6 British Dodgeball championships at Cirencester College finishing in 2nd place.
- Year 5/6 boys and girls netball tournament at Newent school finishing 2nd and 3rd place.
- Year 5/6 boys and girls SEND Panathalon at Hartpury College finishing in 3rd place.
- Year 5/6 girls' football at The Dean Academy finishing in 4th place.
- Year 5/6 boys and girls mountain biking tournament at Newent School finishing in 5th place.
- Year 5/6 Panathalon bowling at TenPin Ten Gloucester finishing in 2nd place.
- Year 5/6 boys and girls Common Wealth Games event at Wydean finishing in 2nd place.
- 18 Year 5/6 boys and girls Gloucester Cricket Tournament at Cinderford cricket club finishing 1st and 3rd.
- Year 5/6 boys and girls County Cricket finals at Bristol Grammar School finishing 4th in their group.
- Year 5/6 boys and girls Common Wealth Team game event at Viney Hill Adventure centre.


